## Norman Carswell



Norman Carswell (14/8/1913 – 19/08/2004) was born near Hastings and initially went to sea with the Merchant Navy but came ashore with continued employment uncertain during the Great Depression of the 1930s. In 1936 he joined the Palestine Police serving there until the end of the British mandate in 1948. It was in Jerusalem, in 1945, that he married Edna Lily Burstow, generally known as "Jill". Among the photographs of him taken in Palestine is one with another Nyasalander, Robin (Matey) Martin. So, in 1948 he joined the Nyasaland Police – he was not alone, as well as Robin Martin, other ex-Palestine Police arriving in Nyasaland included G.J. Morton, R.D.H. Holmes-a-Court, A.R. Lodge, H.J. (Paddy) Nolan, A.M. Kirkham, E.F. Mitchell,

D.K. (Danny) Morrison, A.M. Parry, J.K. (Jack) Humphreys, A.P. Shand, L.P. Acton, J. Holmes, and F. (Frank) Chivers. Norman served in Nyasaland until December 1957 and was stationed variously at Lilongwe, Dedza and Blantyre and was in Cholo during the disturbances there in 1952 when members of the expat families congregated at his house for protection. Following Nyasaland he was employed by the Prison Service in Cyprus for several months until politics between Greek and Turkish population ended that. He went on to spend some four and a half years on contract with the Bahrain government based in the Manama Fort. The family moved to settle in Brisbane in April 1965 where Norman was employed by Mayne Nickless a security company. He eventually retired in 1978 at the age of 65.

His son, Brian (right), was born in London in 1946 and was two when the family moved from Palestine to Nyasaland in 1948 and age 11 when they moved on. His education in Nyasaland, after some correspondence schooling in Dedza with an establishment in Salisbury, was at primary school in Lilongwe and then St Andrews, either boarding at the Sunnyside campus or at the old school next to the mission and then, when it opened, the High School on the Chileka Road. Brian remains in Australia and is resident in the town of Huonville towards the south end of Tasmania.






